Inquiry into Stroke Risk Reduction

The Royal College of General Practitioners is the largest membership organisation in the United Kingdom solely for GPs. The College in Wales welcomes the opportunity to respond to this consultation.

Whilst RCGP Wales welcomes the Welsh Governments strategy on stroke reduction, there is a real risk of duplication of effort and cost in its implementation.

The majority of the patients at risk are already targeted through existing services, especially smoking cessation, blood pressure checks and health reviews for other conditions in which cardiovascular risk is increased. We also question whether there is any genuine evidence to suggest that screening for atrial fibrillation is effective.
